ECOS, Environmental Coalition on Standards, is an international NGO with a network of members and experts advocating for environmentally friendly technical standards, policies and laws.

We ensure the environmental voice is heard when they are developed and drive change by providing expertise to policymakers and industry players, leading to the implementation of strong environmental principles.

Our successes consistently impact standards and laws promoting the environment, pushing for a shift to a sustainable use of resources within a circular economy, and ambitious actions to fight climate change.

We also work towards a more **inclusive**, **open and transparent standardisation system**, internationally and regionally, including European and national levels, at the same time ensuring an appropriate use of standards in support of environmental legislation and policy.

We are part of a number of impactful alliances and campaigns, such as the Rethink Plastic alliance, Coolproducts, Right to Repair, the Cool Coalition, Platform for Electromobility, Wardrobe Change, Coalition for Energy Savings, Better without Boilers, and the One Planet Network, where we cooperate with other NGOs, progressive companies, and researchers, advocating for a greener future for all. We are also a member of the Global Electronics Council's EPEAT Advisory Council, and several important fora, such as the EU CBAM and Carbon Removals Expert Groups or the newly created High-Level Forum on European Standardisation.

For over 20 years now, ECOS has worked towards a healthy and clean environment, protected by **robust rules that respect nature and its resources.** Representing a network of more than 50 members, we bring our environmental expertise and vision to European and international discussions.

A FEW WORDS FROM JUSTIN WILKES

OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2022 saw a big shift for ECOS, with our work leading to major impacts on the development of policies, laws and standards to require more and more sustainable products. But it was also **the fifth warmest year on record,** with climatic extremes experienced across the globe.

At international level, ECOS pushed strongly forward on our work on climate neutrality, and circularity, among others. 2022 also made sure that ecodesign was finally on everyone's lips: from the EU's Ecodesign Sustainable Products Regulation to high-level discussions with our partners in India – ecodesign is seen as a tool for environmental change, in line with our long-standing calls.

The insanity of continuing to use fossil fuels was also brought to evidence, as heating became an (expensive) buzzword. The EU took a step towards phasing out new fossil-fuel operated boilers – targeting a later date than we would have wished, but a date nonetheless – and we will make sure that policymakers see their promises through.

In 2022 we also went back to basics, and focused on the "S" in ECOS: we worked on technical cement standards, ensuring they promote low-carbon solutions, and raising awareness on the fact that we must **urgently decarbonise** this highly polluting sector to ensure that our climate targets stay within reach.



We have long known that we need to make sustainable products the norm. Without policy intervention, by 2050 we are expected to be consuming resources at a rate three times higher than the Earth can regenerate. In 2022, and following many years of advocacy from ECOS, the EU finally launched an initiative which could make this happen – with important repercussions for all products worldwide!

- We were among the very first to call for ecodesign principles to be applied to all sectors.
- We have been extremely active all along the process, providing policymakers with ready-made solutions for extending ecodesign to all products and services.
- We spoke at countless events, published papers, built capacity within our networks and leveraged the power of our long-standing campaigns on the ecodesign framework - all the while exchanging with decision makers on our proposals and how to turn them into reality.



Ensuring greener electronics – sustainable solutions for our everyday devices


2022 brought far-reaching new rules to reduce the environmental impact of everyday devices such as smartphones and printers. ECOS worked behind the scenes to make this happen. Let us walk you through the highlights of new ecodesign rules for phones and tablets, a common charger, and the upcoming mandatory rules for printers.

What difference did we make?

- We pushed for ambitious ecodesign rules to regulate smartphones, raising awareness on the huge environmental impact of these everyday devices, mobilising partners, drafting reports and shaping crucial standards which now serve as a base for the repair score.
- Thanks to our advocacy, small electronic devices will be required to use USB Type-C chargers, cutting tonnes of unnecessary e-waste.
- We firmly said no to throwaway printers. As a result, manufacturers could soon be obliged to abide by mandatory minimum requirements in order for their devices to be allowed on the market.



From Portland to Paris: a step towards a more sustainable cement and concrete industry

The billions of tonnes of cement made each year account for a staggering 8% of global CO₂ emissions – more than the combined emissions of aviation, trucking, and shipping! Given that the global demand for cement will continue to rise, there is no alternative: it is essential to rapidly decarbonise the production of cement. ECOS is helping policymakers and standardisers take steps in this direction, and 2022 saw the development of a new cement standard: prEN197-6, which has the potential to reduce the overall consumption of clinker, the extremely polluting component of traditional cement.

What difference did we make?

- We heavily pushed for the development of the prEN197-6 standard, which presents a high level of ambition in that it allows to substitute clinker with less environmentally damaging recycled concrete fines.
- We strategically joined forces across a number of countries, facilitating the involvement of national partners in their national standards bodies. This, in turn, ensured that our position was represented in various countries, giving it much greater influence in the Technical Committee that developed the new cement standard.
- We led a constructive dialogue both at national and European level, successfully creating momentum and pressure to bring forward an ambitious standard.



Construction products – will regulation finally green the sector?


Concrete, bricks, wood beams, windows... Construction products are essential components of the built environment that surrounds us. However, they also have a huge environmental impact throughout their entire lifecycle. In 2022, we pushed for the EU Construction Products Regulation to live up to its full potential. While the fight is not yet over, we have won some important battles.

What difference did we make?

- ECOS has become the most prominent environmental NGO actively working on construction products, advocating for sustainable (construction) products to become the norm.
- We contributed our environmental expertise and experience to the development of standards and legislation, ensuring an environmental voice in the largely biased, industry dominated fora.
- The proposal for a CPR revision, published by the European Commission in 2022, set a new vision for the sector and rightly acknowledges the role of ecodesign for construction products - in line with what we have long been saying: construction products are... products, and their environmental impacts should be tackled, starting with design.



Durable, repairable and mainstream – on our way to more circular textiles


In 2022, ECOS welcomed the EU Strategy on Sustainable Textiles. The Strategy sets the vision for reforming an extremely polluting sector, in line with what we had been repeating for years: unless we slow down, our planet will become the ultimate fashion victim.





What difference did we make?

- Our key demands made it to the European Commission's Textiles Strategy, which went as far as to quote our 2021 report calling for ecodesign requirements for textiles.
- We mainstreamed the issue: some of the biggest outlets in Europe wrote about our work, and, more importantly, the problem, ensuring widespread awareness-raising.
- We used all possible channels to profile and amplify our calls, and this included presenting at key EU fora, leading joint campaigns, direct advocacy towards MEPs, progressive industry, the EU institutions and media outreach.



Towards a future of efficient, renewable and clean heating

A timely phase-out of fossil fuel boilers would result in an environmental gain of about 110 Mt CO₂ by 2050. This represents two thirds of the total emissions reduction needed from residential and public buildings to achieve climate neutrality by 2050. And 2022 brought important steps in that direction, not least thanks to our expertise and push.

What difference did we make?

- We successfully built momentum for a fossil-fuel boiler ban, which in 2022 was mentioned in the RePowerEU communication, targeting a date for 2029.
- Together with a number of like-minded organisations, we launched a new campaign, Better Without Boilers, which will push policymakers to keep, and increase, their environmental ambition.
- Thanks to our long-standing advocacy including detailed standardisation work, we can finally expect a new energy efficiency testing method for heat pumps, which will ensure testing in real-life conditions for a more accurate result.



EU Standardisation Strategy – our chance to ensure that standards truly work for the environment

In February 2022, the EU published its new Standardisation Strategy. It is a unique opportunity to make standards work for the environment and strive for civil society voices to be properly represented in standard-setting at all levels – a priority for ECOS, and something we have long advocated for.





What difference did we make?

- For over 20 years, we have been defending the environmental interests in standardisation, aiming to strengthen the inclusiveness of the international, national and regional standardisation bodies.
- Throughout the consultation period and preparatory work, we advocated for a political approach to standardisation, which would enable a more effective participation of environmental actors.
- We worked with our broad network, coordinating and mobilising European engagement at national level, all the while influencing the standardisation system's strategic groups and discussions.
- The EU Standardisation Strategy reflects many of our calls, recognising
 the need to modernise the system and engage all relevant actors in
 standards-making, as well as setting out the intention to leverage the
 European Standardisation System to deliver on the green transition.




